The purpose of this option is to encourage student engagement with a community of their choosing, and to consider the international and global implications of their life-worlds, whether it be abroad or at home. Students may choose to study abroad for a semester, a 3-4 week shorter term, or even a year; intern with an approved, internationally-oriented organization (pending departmental advisor's approval); or complete an internationally-related independent study with a fieldwork research component.
